Dr. Karyn Purvis, founder of Trust Based Relationship Intervention (TBRI)

It is with a great sense of loss that we add this tribute to Dr. Karyn Purvis to our newsletter. Dr. Karyn's body succumbed to a long battle with cancer on April 12, 2016. For those of you who are not familiar with her, Dr. Karyn Purvis is probably the single most influential person to Amaris Ministries and the way we train and support foster and adoptive families. She was the director of the TCU Institute of Child Develop-

ment and co-author of the best-selling adoption book, The Connected Child. Several of us have trained directly under her.

Countless parents across the globe mourn the loss of this woman who was akin to a loving grandmother who taught, nurtured, guided and encouraged us with our "children from hard places." To "Miss Karyn," every child was precious and no child was beyond hope if their caretaker could only learn to see the needs beneath their behavior and connect with them in a way that would build a trusting relationship. It is this trusting connection that would then bring about behavioral changes to a child whose very brain chemistry and wiring has been altered due to various forms of trauma and neglect.

Karyn has nurtured literally tens of thousands of children toward healing and health with her melodic voice, soft touch and through her always gentle, gracious, and hopeful ways. She modeled the character of Jesus, described so well in 1 Corinthians 13, "Love is patient, love is kind...It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres."

Jedd Medifind, President of CAFO, lovingly expresses, "Karyn will not teach at the CAFO Summit this year as she did so many times before. But a father will kneel so he can speak face-to-face with his son. A mother will take her daughter's small face in her hands, expressing words of affirmation. Mentors and foster parents and teachers and social workers will listen patiently, explain gently, correct with equal parts firmness and tenderness, and seek connection above all, reflecting the One who created us to connect. That inheritance, passed from one generation to the next, will certainly not stop there. It will echo again, as those children become parents and mentors and teach-

ers themselves someday. And so on, long after the name of Karyn Purvis has been forgotten. Could anyone hope for a legacy greater than that?

And here at Amaris Ministries, the legacy of Dr. Purvis will live on as we continue to use her materials, methods, and those who have been taught by her to



teach others who long to learn how to connect with the children that they parent or work with.
